**Dear Friends,**

What a year 2020 has been, I don't think any of us predicted what has happened. I heard on the news yesterday that "Lockdown" has topped the new word entry in a well-known dictionary. As I write this we are about to enter the season of Advent – made popular in recent times by the promotion of Advent calendars counting down the days to Christmas.

In the church's year Advent is a season of solemn preparation for the big festival in the same way that Lent is a season of preparation for Easter, a time for fasting and prayer. In all my years in Christian ministry I have never heard anyone ask "**What are you giving up for Advent?**" in the way that people ask about Lent.

This year it feels as if we are giving up a lot for Advent – in order to be able to celebrate Christmas. We are giving up being able to meet together as family and friends. Many have had to give up work. We have had to give up meeting together for worship. All of this has been imposed but will only be effective if we comply.



In many ways Advent is a season of hope. One of my favourite aspects of the season is the lighting of Advent candles.

Each of the four Sundays in Advent a different candle is lit symbolising the people who prepared the way for the birth of Jesus: Patriarchs (Abraham, Moses etc.) Prophets, John the Baptist and Mary. The white candle in the middle is lit on Christmas day celebrating the birth of Jesus.

The birth of Jesus, whatever date that might have been, marks a turning point in the history of God's dealings with His people. In Jesus God himself takes on human form and dwells with us, hence the name given to Jesus "*Emmanuel*" God with us. Whatever darkness we may face in our own lives we worship a God who knows and understands. When Jesus lived on earth he taught about and demonstrated the kingdom of God – a kingdom of justice, peace and harmony. During Advent we look forward not just to Christmas but to that time when the kingdom of God will be seen in all its fulness – no more death and disease, all tears wiped away and in its place everlasting peace and light.

May that day come soon. Happy Christmas and a hope-filled new year.

*The latest update on Robin's recovery. 3rd October 2020*

*We have worked him hard to get to this stage and it was, as we knew it would be, a real challenge for him. We hadn't factored in Storm Alex and 60 mph winds on the top of Brown Willy but with me pulling, Merlin pushing and Lizzie pushing the three of us we made it.*

A steady hand and singing Cornish songs all the way down, we walked back to Jamaica Inn to dry out and reflect on the last five months of determination that got us five gruelling miles. It is more than wonderful to have him back in good health and thank you NHS and Derriford Hospital. We found about 50 people had climbed Brown Willy to be with us on the top in bubbles of six, including Kate Tantam, the wonderful Specialist Sister ICU / Rehabilitation nurse who created the healing garden at Derriford. She spoke about the need for more healing gardens and how proud she, and Derriford Hospital, are of Robin, his grit and courage, and his passion to see more gardens to help more very ill patients. At this point I burst into tears and pretty much blubbed all the way down the hill.

*We have now raised over £67,000 for the ICU / Rehab garden at Treliiske. We hope more will come in, in this week's Country Life, and the BBC film on the story of Robin's illness, recovery and challenge which will be shown before Christmas. And, of course, gift aid will help us get to our target of £100,000 – we hope!*



*News from Bodmin Airfield*

**Royal visit to Cardinham**



Cardinham played host to royalty for a fleeting hour in September when Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal flew into Bodmin Airfield in a helicopter of the Royal Flight. Princess Anne has been Patron of the Citizens Advice Bureau since 1990 and was visiting advisors in Bodmin to thank them for keeping up their vital service from their homes during the first lockdown. It's unusual for the royal helicopters to have to use airfields, as they can usually land very close to the site of a visit, but in this case the airfield was the best option.

The visit was three weeks in the planning, and the airfield manager was sworn to secrecy. Most arrangements were made by email and phone, but on the day before the visit some 'men in black' arrived in anonymous vehicles to check security. A few hours before the Princess was due some Close Protection Officers from Devon & Cornwall police arrived in a small convoy. It was all quite low-key. Princess Anne's Sikorsky S76 helicopter arrived from Falmouth, where she had visited the Maritime Museum, and the Lord Lieutenant of Cornwall, Edward Bolitho, was waiting at the airfield to greet her. The transfer to her BMW took only minutes, and the convoy carried her off.

While they waited for her return, helicopter pilots Captain Marcus Brooks and Captain Adam Belton were given tea and muffins by Dot Elderkin, who lives at Little Downs and runs the airfield's café, Diner 31, which has unfortunately been closed for most of this year.

The Princess returned after just over an hour, and the helicopter took her back to her home, Gatcombe Park in Gloucestershire.



## Badgers Matter

Autumn Watch is with us again. Amongst all our wonderful wildlife there is a sadness that I find hard to accept. Looking at the badgers happily playing rough and tumble I cannot forget that the Badger Cull is about to begin. 83% of our Cornish countryside is included in a scheme to cull badgers whether they are healthy or not (apparently only 4% are infected). Also only 5% of TB infection can be attributed to badgers or deer so it is difficult to understand why the culls still go ahead, especially as the culling changes badgers behaviour and causes them to move around – we understand how that works now due to Covid 19.

There is another way – **Badger vaccination**. Cornwall Wildlife Trust, after a fundraising effort last year, was able to pilot the Wildlife Trust Badger Vaccination programme in mid Cornwall.

The Government has also pledged to introduce Badger Vaccination across the country.

If you are interested in this project and would like to hear about the successful Mid Cornwall project and the whole issue of Badger Vaccination then please do look at this excellent video. If nothing else it is very uplifting to hear from farmer Keith Trustcott – what a star.

# This Farming Life - Bodmin Moor Style

## 3rd October

My week off was spent in the Yorkshire Dales with Mum. Having sheared the sheep earlier this season, and then given the old dog a bit of a trim last month, I felt my hairdressing apprenticeship was complete, and gave Mother her first haircut since March. Thankfully she didn't struggle as much as my previous ~~victims~~ clients, and we were both content with the outcome.

It's nearly time to introduce our new ram to the flock. He's due to arrive at the farm on Monday and will then have to self isolate for a short time (sounds familiar!) before he goes to work.

It's a pivotal time in the farming calendar, marking the beginning of next year's production.

## 10th October

I've had a letter from the opticians, informing me it's time for an eye test. I knew it was looming when I noticed that I had labelled some Raspberry Jam as "may contain stones" (thinking it was plum)

Another eyesight fail was a seedling mix up, leaving my Runner Beans gasping and dying in the heat, planted in the poly tunnel, and my French Beans gasping and dying in the cold, planted outside.

The defining "should've gone to Specsavers" moment came when I got a bit teary about a dead hedgehog on the road, only to have my companions fall about laughing and point out that it was a large, squashed, spiny chestnut, rather than my favourite endangered mammal.

## 17th October

A ram living next door had been gazing wistfully over our fence for several weeks. When he wasn't grazing, (building up his strength for the upcoming nuptials) he would stand on a rock to get a better view for most of the day.

Early one morning, he mustered the confidence to leap the fence, only to find that there were still two more fences between him and the woolly objects of his desire. Before he had the time or energy to plan his next athletic leap towards the ladies, his owners arrived to collect him. He trotted home contentedly with the promise of extra food and his own female companions in the coming days.

I've also been amused to witness something like a cow dating agency being discussed on the roadside, the merits of polled rams (less horny, in a sense) and the integration of a new ram into my own flock. This involved a lot of charging around, a bit like a stag night I suppose, and in a group of more than six, so the animal kingdom has the usual parallels to our own.



## 24th October

I had another sheep shopping trip, completing my breeding flock for this season. The journey included a good exploration of the narrow lanes around Winkleigh, with trailer in tow.



We made several wrong turns, before eventually stopping in one of the villages, waiting for someone to lead us to the destination.

While there, our presence was obviously noted by a few residents, who might have been wondering what two ladies and a sheep trailer were up to.

Any reports about sheep rustling in North Devon on 23rd October may be fake news, and in due course the new additions were paid for, loaded and transported home safely.

## 31st October

After a very stormy start to the day we were relieved to have a break in the weather for a bit of essential sheep maintenance. Our sheep handling facilities have been improved beyond all recognition by the BEST fencing team! They were left with an assortment of gates, hinges, crates and rails and a brief to build what they could, a sort of agricultural scrap heap challenge. They did not disappoint and the new sheep race is beyond anything we expected. Thanks guys! This means the batch of lambs leaving the farm, heading for the butcher, received top quality primping and preening before they set off.

## 7th November

Lockdown has overtaken us once again, but we have so much to be grateful for. The beauty of the Autumn leaves at Wooda Bridge is almost breathtaking when the sun is shining through and the sky is blue behind.

There are little fungus growing in nooks and crannies all over the place, demonstrating what a rich and diverse landscape we live in. The Highland Cattle on the moor are looking great against a tonal backdrop of bracken, oak and gorse.

It's rainbow season in the changeable weather, and mulled cider season while snuggling up by the fire. In isolation, we can find inspiration. Instead of loneliness, we can try to enjoy the solitude. Perhaps this year rather than getting all we want, we have to value what we've got.

# CARDYNHAM CHURCH


There are some years which are hard to remember and some you want to forget. What will 2020 be for you?

At St Meubred's church I suspect there has been no other year in over a thousand years of our history when church services have stopped for such a long period. Although moving to online worship with our friends across the Bodmin team is equally a first. As soon as we were allowed to resume worship in person, we did and will again. In the meantime our church is still open each day for private prayer.

This crisis brings to mind our forebears who faced their own disasters. Within living memory a stray bomb smashed our chancel windows. During the first world war news reached the then rector, as it did many others, of the deaths, a year apart, of his two sons. Plague struck in 1665. Armies clashed nearby in 1643 with defeated soldiers chased across the countryside by local people. Established forms of worship were overturned three times in the space of nine years in 1549, 1553 and 1558. When the Black Death struck in 1349 Bodmin lost half its population. No-one knows what happened in Cardinham but it must have been the worst disaster of them all. The Normans came. The first Earl of Cornwall was Cadoc, a survivor of the Cornish royal line. But in 1068 after a revolt at Exeter Count Brian son of The Count of Penthièvre in Brittany, replaced him. When Brian died without an heir William's half-brother Robert, Count of Mortain, became Earl. His steward, Richard Fitz Turol, became the first holder of the 'Honour of Cardinham'. He may have built the castle and rebuilt the church or maybe it was his son William Fitz Richard. Castles were designed to intimidate and dominate. People who had been free had to obey their new lord's orders.

We think of Cardinham as a quiet peaceful place where nothing much changes. Mostly we are right, but sometimes lives are changed forever. Nevertheless the God we worship hasn't changed. Through all the chances and changes of our lives we are not alone. The witness of psalmists thousands of years ago through to the witness of Christian people embedded in our church building is to the God who loves us whatever happens. We look forward to celebrating the birth of his son with you at Christmas.




## Katinka Peter - Part 2

[Last issue (No.88) we read Katinka's school Geography project regarding China Clay, here she continues]

### Employment and Production in China Clay

In 1921 Cornwall produced around 442,817 tonnes. There was an increase in production up to 1930, until a decline due to the Great Depression. It climbed again until around 1937. The Second World War caused a significant decline in production, but after that there was a rapid increase up to around 1966. From then on production rose and fell until a peak was reached in 1989, where 3,139,672 tonnes of china clay were produced. After that it steadily declined to 99,600 tonnes in 2018.

Although Brazil started mining china clay earlier, data was only captured from 1970 onwards. At the beginning production was choppy, with a strong increase in around 1977 that decreased again only 3 years later. The production gradually rose until it overtook china clay production in Cornwall with 2,197,920 tonnes in 2004. Since then production in Brazil has declined slightly, but remains high, with 1,800,000 tonnes of china clay produced in 2018.




### Environmental Consequences

China clay production plays an important economic role in the UK. However, mining companies have had challenges in meeting their environmental responsibilities. One big problem is the disposal of waste. For every tonne of extracted clay, there are nine tonnes of mica waste (slag). This waste is dumped back on the land, which, over the past 250 years has changed the local skyline considerably. It is impossible to use the land for farming, and some people may find the clayhills ugly, though

others call them the Cornish Alps. These days, though, less slag is dumped. A lot is used for other industries, such as making secondary aggregates for building and roads.

Water pollution is a significant challenge. Until recently, water used in the hydraulic mining of china clay used to run straight into rivers and the sea making them white. Whilst clay and associated waste products are not poisonous, they suffocate or damage invertebrates and small fish. Nowadays the runoff is piped but still causes water pollution due to poor pipe maintenance. Imerys, the only mine owner in Cornwall since 1999, has come before courts several times to answer charges of polluting the area's rivers. For example, in 2017 Imerys had to pay a £100,000 fine for flushing poisonous chemicals out of tanks and into its effluent system, from where it entered a river.

A third problem is that china clay mining is a very energy-intensive industry. Imerys uses around 500 million kWh of electricity each year in Cornwall. About 40% of this is used in pumping and wet processing of the clay. Drying accounts another 30% of consumption. Its high use of electricity means that Imerys has to pay an expensive climate change levy (CCL) of around £1.6 million a year. As a consequence Imerys has recently fired 300 local staff and moved its high energy operations overseas.

## IF IT'S NOT ONE PROBLEM...?

Unprecedented...now there's a word we've all heard before. Not only has the word been used with the current pandemic but it could also be applied to '*Hymenoscyphus fraxineus*' or ash die back.

This is a fungus that originated in Asia where the native trees don't seem to have been so badly affected. However, it was introduced into Europe about 30 years ago. Our native ash didn't evolve with the fungus and hasn't any natural defence against it, hence the problem.

Already some large trees in the parish have been felled as a result of infection. The Woodland Trust, alarmingly, state that the country could lose up to 80% of its ash trees. So how is it spread?

The fungus lives in fallen leaves on the ground. Small fruiting bodies are produced during the late summer and eventually release spores, which can be blown miles away. When they land on an ash tree they work their way into the leaves into the tree. The fungus then starts growing and will block the water transport system, causing the poor old tree to die. The wood then becomes brittle and, if the tree is in a public place, or in an area where it falls could cause damage to buildings or, for that matter, anyone, or thing, underneath it, the tree will need felling.

However, the Forestry Commission states '*With the exceptions of felling for public safety, we advise a general presumption against felling living ash trees, whether infected or not.*'

The fungus is more widespread in the east and centre of Cornwall. There are some parts where it hasn't been found, but it is expected to spread to such areas within a few years. So keep an eye on the trees' safety as the disease progresses and prune or fell them ONLY if the tree or its branches threaten to cause injury or damage. Do report new cases of the disease to the Forestry Commission through their Tree Alert service.



As you possibly know ash die back symptoms are fairly obvious. Leaves develop large dark patches in the summer. These leaves wilt and change colour to black. Shoots and leaves dieback and lesions develop where affected branches meet the main trunk of the tree.

Some trees will survive and some appear to be resistant but you have been warned... as I say... another wretched 'unprecedented' disease. Keep an eye out for it.
