Dear Friends,

Wasn't the Coronation a splendid occasion? No matter whether you are a monarchist or a republican, one can't help but admire the pageantry and history on display. It was obviously a great show with stunning music, brilliant costumes and the wonderful historic setting of Westminster Abbey, but what was the underlying significance? What kind of King is Charles III going to be?

When Jesus was born, King Herod was worried. He felt threatened by talk of a new king being born. He failed to understand that Jesus was a different kind of king with a very different kingdom. Perhaps the clearest definition of His kingship, which was echoed in the coronation service, was when Jesus said that He had come not to be served but to serve. Jesus was and is a servant king.

He demonstrated this when washing His disciple's feet at the Last Supper. Not only did Jesus see His kingship in this way, He also commanded His followers to copy His example – to live out their lives in self-sacrificial service. We see this played out in all kinds of ways in our own community and in countless unseen ways too.

So as King Charles pledged to serve us, so may we serve others in our daily lives.

Millpool Methodist Church, hopefully you know where we are! Just in case, we're only ten minutes from Bodmin, in the parish of Cardinham, just off the A30 on the edge of Bodmin Moor. What's the image in your mind? A sleepy little old fashioned church perhaps? Well, that's not us! We're anything but sleepy or old fashioned, although we do proudly believe we retain some good old fashioned Cornish welcome and charm!



Our weekly choir practise during Covid, well that was something else! We Zoomed! A completely unknown phenomenon, we sounded more like a Cat's Choir! But being good "moorlanders" we didn't give in! We quickly found the mute button and realised we had to sing to ourselves or any unfortunate being within hearing! We persevered and learnt *Tears in Heaven* and even made a video of this. The **Millpool Chorale** is a group of about 20 ladies who

have given many concerts over the past 30 plus years, the most recent being a concert at Mount, on Good Friday. You're very welcome to come along 7.15 on a Monday evening to Millpool Community Room to see if you might be interested in joining the Choir.

Our Zoom Sunday evening Quiz was another highlight of the week and meant people still saw each other's happy smiling faces! Covid was a tricky time but we opened up as soon as we were allowed, although appreciating the online resources, we were so pleased to get back to having our Church Services again, we're a sociable bunch! Like every group we never quite returned to "normal" but we're still going strong. We are so grateful to all those who put their offering on standing order as this allowed us to be financially viable throughout this time. Have we returned to what we were? Well, we're getting there!

Our regular groups in our very own warm space i.e. **Coffee Morning**, **Book Club**, **Crafternoon**, **Kidz Club** on first Sunday of the month and the **Millpool Chorale** are enjoyed by many. We finished 2022 with **Millpool's Christmas Party**! A very lively event with about 50 people and many children having a wild time! We played games, Pass the Parcel and I'm going to say it "Little Willy" which has always been such fun and a great tradition. We moved the chairs, we had a small set of disco lights and of course a fabulous buffet and, wow, did we have some wild kids, having the time of their life! The adults weren't far behind! So far this year we've held a **Quiz** and a **Games** (Card and Board Games) afternoon, after which one child was heard to say "that was a very lovely afternoon"! A little appreciation makes all the effort worthwhile. More recently, our **Coronation Sunday Celebrations** were enjoyed by approx 50 people. We even had to bring more chairs into the Chapel



for the 30 minute **All Age Service**. We haven't had to do that for a very long time! The bluebells and wood anemones on the walk were beautiful and we are very grateful to everyone who brought food, came to the event and shared in the buffet lunch. We would love to welcome more people from the Community to our events, just take your pick, you never know you might even enjoy it!

We regularly collect for the **Food Bank** and endeavour to help many charities. Our **Christmas Card** fund raised £80 for *Action for Children*, we raised funds and donated £350 to *Shelterbox* and £325.00 to the *Turkey and Syria Earthquake Disaster Fund*. Our **Coffee Morning** at the end of March raised £350 for *Cornwall Air Ambulance* and the well renowned **Millpool's BIG BREAKFAST** in April, served up 60 full English and raised £400 (due to the generosity of members helping with expenses) for our own funds. This will enable us to keep going and doing throughout the year!

We don't worship our building but we do care for it to the best of our ability. We have recently replaced our kitchen for which we paid £1 over thirty years ago. To cut a long story short, Howdens gave us an approx 80% discount on a new kitchen and John said he was happy to do the work for us, a fully indentured tradesman! No dallying around, no fussing over colours, after all you will never find 20 people who like the same thing, and does it really matter! We had worked our kitchen long and hard over the years and now mainly because of his hard work and dedication we have a kitchen of which we are very proud!



Over the years our members have all dedicated much time and energy to **Millpool Methodist Church**, we are very grateful. Alongside this members have, for example, helped to organise the **Cardinham Helpline** to help parishioners and provide the monthly lunch to fund this, and to this day are still regularly cooking, aided by committee members. **Friends of St Petroc's Homeless Charity** (Bodmin Group) was also set up by a member of our Chapel, with others as Committee Members, although sadly housing people is difficult at the moment because of the shortage of affordable properties, other members are actively working within the surrounding villages where they live.

Hope you enjoyed this snapshot of life at our Church! We would be very pleased to welcome you at a **Sunday Service** or one of our events for all ages! There's no pressure to come along weekly or to do or to give! We're happy to see you at any time. Just open the door and we know there will be a smiling face to greet you!

Norman Gerald Worden sadly passed away on 30th March 2023. He will be greatly missed by our community. Here, Sheila and Norma share his Eulogy that Chris Little read at his funeral, our thoughts are with you.

EULOGY

Gerald was a fiercely independent bugger, hated being ill, hated being dependant on others - tolerated me and Chris Line to help him get out and about- Chris became known as butler- even Jan has been known to refer to him as such. I was introduced to all and sundry as his minder.

We spent a lot of time in the car and he loved travelling about his old stomping ground around Mount - every house had a tale to tell, most fields he knew who planted it, when and what the yield was, but mostly it was about old characters. As his health declined our trips out tailed off but the stories continued.

He was born and raised on a farm near Mount, didn't get to school much as the demands for the farm took precedence but he grew big, strong, bright and full of mischief. For example, another lad was flaunting his new push bike but was horrified to find it missing from outside the house, a fortnight later he was the last person in the village to notice it hanging from the foot peg of a telegraph pole where Gerald had hung it.

A young couple married and returned from honeymoon - lit the fire, the fire wouldn't draw and the bungalow filled with smoke, so they made the fire out, fetched the rods, looked up the chimney and couldn't understand it, they could see daylight. Gerald had cemented a pane of glass over the top of the chimney!

The village was spared from greater excesses when Gerald discovered other avenues to expend his energy in various sports and wooing Sheila. Often relying on brute strength, vigour, enthusiasm and competitiveness rather than speed or skill he enjoyed considerable success. He wasn't bad at sport either!

He was a natural horseman, he helped break in 'Lonesome Boy' a champion Point to Point hunter and he was once rodeo champion of Cornwall. He competed well in most games and past times but found his true vocation as a second row forward for Liskeard/ Looe RFC. He combined the strength of a cart horse with the speed and grace of a racehorse and the brains of a rocking horse.

He proudly held the record of being the first member of the team to be sent off, but the pinnacle of his playing career came in 1956 when they played bitter rivals Launceston, who they had never beaten. A wager ensued and after the game which sounds more like a war of attrition, Liskeard/Looe romped home 3-0! The wager was honoured and to the victors went the spoils - the mascot from the clubhouse. Sadly nowhere in Liskeard or Looe would house it, and so the Hole in the Wall in Bodmin became the proud recipient of a glass cased lion where it resides to this day.

Despite his love of rugby and disinterest in soccer he saw the need for physical activity for the burgeoning youth of Mount. (not least his own burgeoning youth- pointing at Paul) He helped Frank Atkinson set up and run Mount FC, and to this day one or other of his “boys” - now hoary 60 year old farmers and tradesmen- would stop by to visit “*The Gaffer*”.

He was also active in Warleggan YFC, served as president and most importantly taught generations of farmers to weld. He had a natural aptitude for engineering, loved to see how things worked, and if he once saw something he could reproduce it. Gerald, with Sheila’s cousin Keith, went into business making spreaders and rollers and had a factory on Walker Lines opposite Barnecutts.

If he had his time again he told me he would have been a mason as he loved working in stone, but he was born to farm. Father had run sheep, But Gerald found them just daft and had a tendency to wonder off and die. He ran a dairy herd but felt tied to it every day, and gave that up when they changed from churns to tankers. He didn’t mind rearing beef but found the return minimal, he raised pigs- loved his pigs- built innovative pig houses, trouble was it was more like working with people - whenever one fell in the slurry pit he would dive in to save it, and they would both need hosing off in the yard - and it broke his heart to see them go off to slaughter. Of course, he had grown up with horses, working heavies and breaking hunters and felt it was cruel on horses, too time consuming and too expensive, so when Norma and Paul wanted a pony, a compromise had to be reached - get a donkey!! Donkeys are deceptively strong, resilient, loyal, cunning, intelligent, mischievous and strong willed (some might say stubborn) all housed in a compact body not immediately attractive and with a reputation of stupidity- Gerald had found his soul mate!



Together Gerald and Henry-then Humphrey, Harry, Dino, Jimmy and Basil could take on the world. The possibilities were endless, every carnival, nativity play, school visit, donkey derby, hospital fete and summer weekends at Jamaica Inn dressed as a bumpkin, no-one was safe. He’d found his true *forté*, dressing up, playing the fool, working with donkeys and liberating unsuspecting visitors from their holiday money for charity. He had the uncanny knack of aiming jokes that were a little *risqué* but didn’t offend, he could talk to anyone and treated everyone exactly the same. He and Henry got into a few scrapes such as at St Columb carnival when the village copper wanted to know what was in the back of the truck “*oh, a lion*” said Gerald. The copper looked in and Henry hooted and kicked up such a ruckus - exit copper, stage left!

Then there was the time after appearing at Truro cathedral, Sheila was leading Henry around Trafalgar roundabout to get back to the trailer, Gerald went the other way around it so Henry stopped and dragged Sheila back around the roundabout to walk with him!

His friendship with Frank Atkinson and his ability to raise money for charity got him invited to join the Lions Club of Bodmin, and he proved to be a stalwart of the club. His drive and personal contacts made the Ten Tors walk- now in its 40th year - possible. The same is true of the charity fun-ride and the swimathon. Of course, all these activities included him volunteering Sheila's services too! He served the club as president several times and represented it at zone, district and national level. A frequent prank played when presidents take office is to steal the ceremonial gavel. When Gerald became president for the 3rd time he made 40 spares which he carried in a bag (produce spare gavel from pocket).

Gerald, being Gerald, took this simple prank to a nuclear level. At a very formal District Governors hand-over dinner, Gerald blagged his way early into the dining room to "*check the seating*" and stole the gavel. At the start of the meal everyone trooped in and stood to await the top table guests to be announced. The Master of Ceremonies couldn't find the gavel - "*We won't proceed until it is returned*" silence, with everyone looking around trying to identify the guilty party - followed by a clatter as the gavel falls off Ken Clarke's chair (previous District Governor and close friend of Gerald). Ken did the walk of shame and the meal proceeded. Dear old Ken went to his grave a few years ago still blissfully unaware that it was Gerald that had done it.

Gerald was also a great supporter of the Christmas sleigh, for many years around the villages and occasionally in Bodmin. The time Brian Liggatt hadn't properly attached the trailer and it detached, careering Santa, sleigh and sweets down Rhind Street can never be forgotten.

A friend of mine was once asked in a pub quiz "*what is the first sense to go when you die*" After some deliberation he replied "*humour*". Well, that certainly was not the case with Gerald. In his final days he would raise his mood and 'perform' for his many visitors, charming the nursing and caring staff and joking with the GP. Sadly it took its toll and he found it increasingly tiring. When we knew the end was near he thoroughly enjoyed making plans for this service and the do at the Rugby club. He insisted I spoke so there would be "*a bit of humour*"- in truth, I think he would have liked to have done this bit himself but accepted the practicalities.

Then we had time to talk about his beliefs - he didn't bother with church or chapel, but respected those who do - "*We'll have The Lords Prayer because Sheila would like that*". He did believe in what I call Cornish karma, treat everyone as you would want to be treated, one day you may be in need, he often said to me how lucky he was that people were prepared to help him, of course he couldn't see that it was payback for all the help he had given.


If something is good, maintain it - if something can be better, improve it. This mantra is reflected in every piece of land he farmed every machine he owned or adapted and in every relationship he had. He loved this little corner of the world but saw himself as its custodian, maintaining and improving it for the generations to come.

He didn't believe in heaven or hell or an afterlife - felt it would be far too crowded. He did believe that we live on in our loved ones hearts and memories and hoped that those memories would raise a smile.

And now a final piece of advice from the wisest fool I've known to the people he held most dear- "*Do try to be good, but if you can't, at least be good at it*!"



A warning to non-gardeners.

So you think this is just a pretty wild flower.

But beware. This is in fact the Three-Cornered Leek - *Allium triquetrum*.

It is an **invasive non-native plant, listed on Schedule 9 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act**. It is therefore an offence to introduce this plant to the wild in the UK. It is also controlled



under EU regulations to which we are still subject. It is easily recognised, and distinguished from wild garlic and similar alliums. The flowers themselves are white and bell-shaped, resembling bluebells. The stalks, having three corners, are triangular in shape. It has long thin leaves with parallel veins and a deep central keel, and it grows from a small white bulb. And it smells of onions.

It can be found in dappled shade, grass verges, waste ground and gardens.

It is not, as yet, such a serious problem as Japanese knotweed or Himalayan balsam, but other parts of the country are far worse affected than Cardinham. However it is increasing, and you can see patches near the Holywell road junction to Cardinham, for example. Knowledgeable gardeners in the Parish have been wisely digging it up as soon as they see the first shoot.

If you see it, dig it up before it gets a hold, but dispose of it carefully to avoid spreading it. Glyphosate can also be effective if you do not mind using sprays.

Most important, don't be fooled! Get rid of it.

It's not a protected pretty wild flower that you must not pick!

Cardinham Parish Council discussed this at its May meeting, and felt it might help parishioners. Thank you **Archie and Pauline Bonker** for bringing this to our attention.

CARDYNHAM CHURCH

Have you visited St Meubred's church?

For a service, an event or just to enjoy its peace or history? If so, you are in good company. A recent survey found that more than half of UK adults (54%) had visited a church in the past year. Of those a quarter (25%) visited for a religious service, one in five (22%) for a non-religious community activity, and one in six (17%) went as a visitor or tourist. That's an awful lot of visits. I wonder how St Meubred's compares? I know that our visitors book is full of fascinating comments from visitors and it isn't unusual to find someone visiting if I pop in during the week.

The same survey found that 73% of UK adults agree that churches are an important part of the UK's heritage and history. When asked what their top three choices would make them more likely to visit to enjoy a church's history, free entry came out top at 28%, somewhere to have a drink or a light snack next at 26%, then a warm welcome (25%), information about the building (24%) and knowing it was open every day (21%). You can visit St Meubred's for free everyday of the week during daylight hours. We have a leaflet about the church, we'd like to have tea and coffee making facilities, but our resident bats make this difficult. Mostly, you'll have the place to yourself, but we love having visitors, so if someone is around you might get an impromptu tour.

In many other countries, church upkeep is the responsibility of state or local government. In the UK there is no regular public funding for historic churches and chapels. We are very grateful for all our friends who help with our church. Especially the financial support of *Friends of St Meubred's*. Any money given for church upkeep is ring-fenced for this. We love our church. It is only here because generation after generation of Cardinham people have cared for it.

The church and churchyard take you into the deep history of Cardinham, reaching back 1400 years to the early Christian memorial stone by the gate, 1100 years to our lovely Cardinham cross by the porch, 900 years to the massive Norman stone font, 500 years to re-used stones from a shrine to St Meubred, 600 years to the Thomas Awmarle brass, 400 years to our three 17th century monuments, the King Charles letter, royal coat of arms and Glynn memorial. None would have survived without Cardinham people caring for them. Their future depends on us in our turn and on future generations.
