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

Enforcement Information *from Jenny Cruse*

Last month **Blisland Parish Council** invited a Senior Enforcement Officer to talk to Parish Councillors about how the Enforcement department work. The officer gave a very human and informative explanation on a subject that is somewhat contentious and certainly of concern to many residents. Any member of the public can and does report what they consider to be an enforcement issue. However, this cannot be discussed in public until a final notice has been served. It is always a good idea to firstly check that this action is not permitted development you can find that information at <https://interactive.planningportal.co.uk/> or that a planning application has already been made. You can check this on the Council planning simple search website just click 'maps' then select 'all time' on the funnel and then zoom in to the area and all the planning applications will come up. Once reported there is a flow chart of action, and requests can be made to see what stage the enforcement action is at. If the action is considered to cause a high level of harm, then it tends to be dealt with more expediently. Of course, 'harm' can be a subjective matter and some decisions are not always what one would expect or desire. I currently have over twenty actions in my ward which have been reported by members of the public, and it is fair to say that the Enforcement service is massively stretched and struggling to keep up. It is intended to allocate more funds to the service in next years' budget.

Gardening Club Report - 18th July 2023



Members were met by Jay Gates, the Airfield Manager, at **Bodmin Airfield** on Monday 19th June. A lovely, sunny, if blustery evening, but just right for a visit to the wildflower meadows. Jay is a very keen and knowledgeable naturalist and was able to give us a fascinating walk through the meadows, describing flora as he went and pointing out the very many unusual and abundant species established there. Jay explained that Bodmin Airfield has been recognised as having the largest traditional hay meadow in the whole of the South West. Ian Bonallick, the

Botanical Recorder for Cornwall, identified over 150 species of wild flowers, grasses and ferns, including over 3000 orchids of three different species. What a real treat to walk through *Southern Marsh Orchids*, *Yellow Rattle* and *Eye Bright* amongst many others, and all just on our doorstep!



We meet next for our Social on July 21st when this year we are very kindly hosted at **Tregrehan Garden** by Tom Hudson, and Richard, head gardener will give us a short tour of the walled garden. A rare opportunity to visit this garden full of exotic plants and learn more about them and their acquisition.



MY CORNISH ROOTS by Lizzy Smart



Whilst moving recently I found a box of family memorabilia with two newspaper cuttings about my great grandfather Thomas Oates who originally hailed from Gwennap in Cornwall.

My mother Ruth told me that her father Harold Oates had said that Thomas, plus herdsmen, had trekked all the way from Cornwall to London with a herd of cows. Apparently, Queen Victoria gave Thomas grazing rights on the Royal Parks around London. But I hadn't heard the following as written by John Hunt in this newspaper article:

RATIONING RUINED OLDEST LOCAL FIRM

One of the oldest firms in Wimbledon put up their shutters for the last time on Saturday. After 89 years in Wimbledon High Street, Thomas Oates, the butchers, closed down.

"It won't seem the same without the old shop there," said 70 year old Mr William Russell who began work with the firm in 1898.

Although the old family business has shrunk, it will still be kept alive. Kenneth Oates (aged 27) will become a Smithfield Market salesman and his mother, Mrs Emma Oates will continue to manage the firm's delicatessen in the High Street.

If the firm had carried on it would have seen the end of meat rationing on July 5th. Said Mrs Oates: "Meat rationing was our ruination. All the big families we catered for were down to 10d or 1s 2d a week for their meat."

The firm started in 1865 when Thomas Oates came from Cornwall. He intended to market meat produced by his brothers in that county. The business opened in a small shop next door to the present premises. A branch in the Broadway was later obtained. This was closed in 1922. Two other shops in London were opened and later closed.

Mr Russell was manager of the High Street shop until 1951 and recalls the early days of the firm. Thomas Oates rented grazing land at Peek's Estate, which stretched from Dairy Walk to Wimbledon Parkside where he kept 200 Welsh sheep. "We would go down and get some of them in the pound. Then we would drive them up here to the slaughter house behind the shop." said Mr Russell.

Wimbledon Motor Works (This was owned by one of Thomas's brothers) has now taken over the land where the Oates's slaughter house stood. There used to be stables there also. "We used to have five delivery carts and take the meat to all the large houses," recalls Mr Russell. "Then we had a two-horse van for Smithfield Market."

But Thomas Oates did not let the grass grow under his feet. He was probably the first man to enter Smithfield Market with a motor van. Mr Russell went there with him and remembers how the crowds stared.

Mr Russell's duties in the shop would be interrupted by a call to go down to Wimbledon Railway Station. Sheep would arrive from Guildford Market and the men drove them through the streets to the slaughter house.

The local people who were well-off would have two meals a day, states Mr Russell, and large amounts of meat would be eaten at lunchtime parties. "There was a great variety of meat in those days, but what has happened to the Scotch beef and English lamb now?" he asks.

Mr Thomas Oates died in 1922 and Mr Harold Oates carried on until his death in 1949."

My parents and my three eldest siblings lived two flights above the Wimbledon Village High Street butchers (pictured) until 1959 which didn't cease trading as reported in this article. I remember as a youngster with my siblings helping ourselves to freshly minced meat - what would Health & Safety have to say about this now I wonder?!

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

CARDYNHAM CHURCH

We are delighted that, thanks to the help of the **Cally Barrett Wind Turbine Community Fund** we have been able to provide disabled access to the cemetery.



Long before there was a church at Cardinham, there was a graveyard, surrounded by a bank and ditch, probably on the site of St Meubred's grave. The shaft of the stone cross overlooking the steps to the graveyard is the earliest object on site. It is a tall granite inscribed memorial stone and was found against the south east corner of the churchyard wall and was erected here in 1896.

It is said to have been inscribed in Latin '**Ranocori fili Mesgi**': in English '**Ranocorus son of Mesgus**'. See if you can make it out. The inscribed side faces away from the steps, I can't! There are about 40 of these inscribed stones with Latin and/or Ogham (an alphabet used to write the early Irish language from 4th - 6th centuries AD). inscriptions. It is a sign of a very early Christian site. You can see a legible example in Lanivet church.

Since that time, the graveyard surrounding the church has been the last resting place for Cardinham residents until it was closed in 1909. The cemetery down the road, with the new disabled access, was consecrated in 1899. We know from our Visitors Book how often people make a special visit to find the graves of their ancestors. Look around at the grave stones and see the names of so many local families.

Important people tended to be buried inside churches. The oldest we know of is **Thomas Awmarle** whose brass we had copied so everyone can see it. Rectors had the right to be buried in the Chancel, so he is likely to be one of many. In the Lady Chapel is the splendid memorial to the Glyn family. It is likely that this was their memorial chapel and that generations of Glyns are buried there.

Every parish had a cemetery. The right to bury the dead and to baptise were the key privileges of a parish church from medieval times. All churchyards by law were required to be "**decently enclosed with a wall, hedge or ditch**" so the boundaries were clear and animals couldn't stray in. The rector could graze his animals there, they didn't have lawnmowers so animals kept the grass down. He could also use any trees for fuel. There were often public paths. It was a social meeting place so other church laws prohibited "**dances and dishonest games**" and even wrestling. Worse things happened, at least 33 cases of bloodshed were reported in Cornwall and Devon to the bishop of Exeter between 1421 and 1454! With burials the ground level rose. In our case there are over 1000 years of burials. No wonder they needed a new cemetery in 1899!

I joined the **Safer Bodmin Anti-Social Behaviour Pop Up event** on 7th July at Mount Folly. All the main agencies were there to talk about this subject, and we intend to continue this monthly. Before the meeting I enjoyed a bacon butty at the **St Petroc's breakfast club** and a good chat with residents. What an amazing facility and huge thanks to the great band of volunteers and the amazing work they are doing to help those in need.

Last year I brought a Motion to full Council for the **protection of Marine and Coastal wildlife**.
