CARDINHAM BELL RINGERS

Following our successful beetle drive in April raising just over £200, we have managed to have some bell ropes repaired and purchase parts to make a rope warmer to prevent any further rope damage due to the damp conditions within the tower.

It was lovely to see so many people at the community event in July we had a total of 22 teddies go down the zip wire



After the total takings were added together and shared out equally between the clubs and charities taking part each group took £102, which we decided to donate to the tower repair fund.

We had surveys done on the bells and areas around them, and we were informed of a range of work that needed to be completed for the bells to be continued to be rung safely. Over the summer we started on this list, one evening we arranged a “cleaning party” where we cleaned and tidied in, under and around the bells and frames



During this time we also repaired the clock hammers, you may have noticed the bells chimes are now sounding clearer because of this.

We have also sourced some second hand bell parts from Ladock church for a donation towards their full restoration.

We still have plenty of work to do to keep the bells in top condition so they can be rung for many more years to come.

Article from Eric Thomas, a local resident, about his father's Army Service in Far East during WW2.

George Henry Thomas' (1922 - 2001)

Served in the Royal Army Medical Corps during WW2

Eric Thomas' father, George Thomas, was born in 1922 and married his mother at St John's Church, Swindon, Staffordshire in September 1942. After a few months of married bliss he was posted to A Company of R.A.M.C. for field ambulance training. He then travelled to Africa on the Empire Pride troopship and suffered terrible sea sickness. From there he travelled to Asia where he joined India Command and was stationed at 8th Indian Casualty Clearing Station, Burma, a military hospital, and from here he was sent to "The Theatres of War" where he went out on the field ambulance to pick up the soldiers injured in jungle warfare. These soldiers were known as "*The Forgotten Army*", hence George not returning home until 2 years after the war finished in Europe. Eric later heard his father describe the conditions they were living in "*as a living hell and dire*".

After serving in India, Burma, Java and Singapore, George was posted back to his barracks in August 1946 and finally returned home in 1947.

Eric was born 6 months after his father was called up so didn't know him until he was nearly 4 years old, and like many children of that time his father was a virtual stranger to him.

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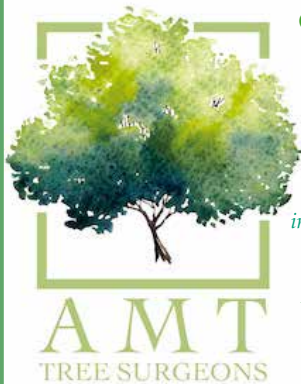

What happens if there's an Emergency in the Parish

Earlier this year there was a major wildfire on the Moor above Millpool. Some residents were told by the Emergency Services that they might need to evacuate their properties but it wasn't clear where they should go. As a result the Parish Council decided to write a simple Emergency Plan which is now held by Cornwall Council, displayed on the Parish noticeboards and website and reproduced below. We hope this is helpful but that it will never be needed.

Cardinham Parish Emergency Plan

The major potential Risks to People in Cardinham Parish that could require their Evacuation to a Designated Safe Place are:

1. Fires on the Moor, in Woodland and at Farms and Homesteads
2. Fires including Gas Explosions in Properties
3. Chemical Spills on Farms and Roads
4. Exceptional Weather Conditions (rain, snow, wind)
5. Flooding of Property
6. Landslips affecting Properties
7. Electrical Outages extending over a significant area or time
8. Major road traffic or aircraft accidents
9. Incidents affecting the School

The following arrangements are in place for a major Emergency in the Parish that requires Evacuation of People from the Scene, their Homes or Places of Work:

1. Anyone involved in or becoming aware of a major Incident in the Parish that is or may pose a risk to life should ring 999 immediately to request assistance from the Emergency Services
2. This Emergency Plan for Cardinham Parish is held by Cornwall Council for their use in the event of a major Emergency
3. Cardinham Parish Council has a small Emergency Committee which holds a list of Contacts who may be able to assist during or after a major Emergency, but it does not have its own Emergency Response Team
4. The Parish has Community Access Defibrillators and Emergency Bleed Kits which are available in locked Cabinets in the telephone box opposite Cardinham School (w3w: apprehend.screaming.clays), outside Millpool Chapel (w3w: vertical.nesting.refer) and on the green at Littledowns (w3w: readings.airless.conveying). The code to access this equipment is available from the 999 Operator
5. The Lead Emergency Official (Police or Fire) in charge of dealing with the Emergency will alert all People in the Danger and At Risk Areas, and advise Evacuation if necessary to a Named Safe Point or the Designated Safe Place
6. The Designated Safe Place in the Parish is Cardinham Parish Hall (w3w: holiday.select.wove), although Evacuees may elect to go to a Named Safe Place of their own choosing such as with Friends or Family

7. The Key Holders of Cardinham Parish Hall will be informed by the Lead Emergency Official as soon as possible if an Evacuation is required so that the Hall can be prepared to receive Evacuees
8. Evacuees will need to take the necessary clothing and other belongings, including at risk pets as allowed by the Lead Emergency Official, to ensure their own comfort in the Hall
9. The Lead Emergency Official will inform the Chair of Cardinham Parish Council of the Emergency, and when an Evacuation has been recommended
10. The Lead Emergency Official will keep all concerned up to date on the Emergency and inform Evacuees when it is safe to return to their Homes or Places of Work

Time to cut overhanging hedges and trees

Autumn has arrived and it's that time of year again! After a very healthy Summer's growth, please can all landowners with hedges, gorse or trees on their property that are next to a public road or right of way arrange to have them cut back as soon as possible so that everyone has safe access to roads, footpaths and bridleways. In particular, please make sure that visibility is not impeded at junctions, passing places and on bends. According to the regulations, two lane roads should be cleared to a minimum width of 5.5m (18ft) to maintain the free flow of traffic, and single lane roads to a minimum of 2.75m (9ft). Where there is a verge this should be cleared back to 1.5m (5ft) for pedestrian use and to aid visibility. Main verges will be cut by Cornwall Council contractors. Overhanging trees and bushes must be cut to a minimum height of 2.1m (7ft) over footpaths, to 2.5m (8ft) over bridleways and to 5.2m (17ft) over roads. The responsibility to maintain your own hedges and trees applies whether you are a landowner, farmer, business owner or occupier of a residential property. If growth becomes a problem Cornwall Council can serve formal notice on the owner/occupier requiring the work to be completed in a specified time period. If this is not done they can carry it out and will recover the costs from you. Thank you for your co-operation to make our Parish safer and look tidier over the Winter. - 2 A child was told to multiply £5. 16s. 7d by 36. He gave an answer of £ 235.16s.11d. By how much was he wrong ? *(As if he really cared?)*
- 3 A train 88 yards in length has to pass completely through a tunnel one and half miles long. How long does it take from the time the engine enters the tunnel until the last carriage leaves the tunnel, if the train is travelling at 31 miles per hour?
- 4 *Time allowed 30 mins.* 'A young rabbit wandered away from his burrow, ran into danger and returned safely. Tell his adventures to his family.' *(Should have told his mum first!)*
- 5 *Time allowed 45 mins* 'Suppose you are taken to the aerodrome at Croydon to watch Sir Alan Cobham start on his flight to Australia. After talking to him briefly he asks you to go with him on the flight. You decide to accept the invitation and you are told to be ready to start at nine o'clock that evening. Give an account of what you can expect to see on the journey?' *(Better tell your mum first!)*

CARDYNHAM CHURCH

I stood on the chancel steps at St Meubred's with an Australian visitor and thought about her ancestors. On 4th July 1848 William John Sandercock stood on this same spot when he married Jane Best. Three days later they set sail for South Australia. They were both aged 20. What stories this church can tell. Our visitors book is full of people in search of their ancestors.

Together Carmel Riordan, the Australian visitor, and I wandered through the churchyard. She told me that William's father was John Sandercock, Blacksmith of Wilton (now Welltown?) who lived at 'The Old Mill'. William's uncle, Henry, (John's brother) was the head gardener at Glynn House. Carmel left me a copy of the book she has published on her family history. William and Jane flourished in Australia. Seven brothers served in the First World War – and they all came home. The book is now circulating among interested people and I've asked for it to be left with our books for loan in the church.

I've already written about the problems we have with our church tower, so I thought you were due an update. Rob Orchard, who does work for us, repaired the base of the finials on the tower roof in July. The bellringing team had a cleaning night recently and removed dead birds and branches from around the bells and they have fixed the clock hammers.

This is a great start but now we are waiting for tenders to the substantial work to tower principal beams, chamber floors, bell frame and louvres and we need steeplejacks for the tower patch pointing. Once these tenders are in we will know how much we need to raise and start making funding applications. We are also beginning to plan fundraising events. Any help with this and of course any donations are very welcome. There's a tab on our card machine in church for our tower fund.

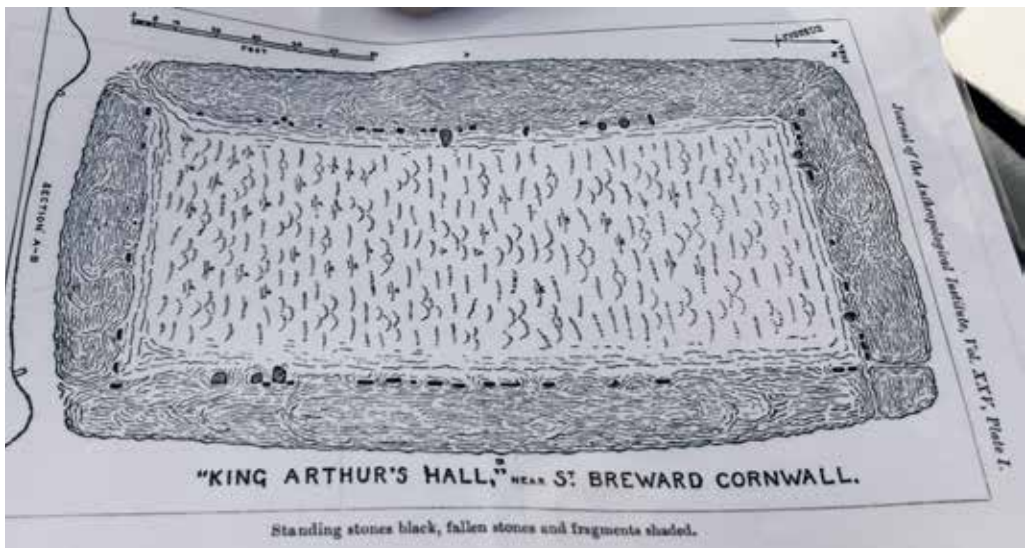
WARLEGGAN HISTORY GROUP

Iain Rowe of Cornwall National Landscape Team will lead us on a walk over these areas and in particular to "King Arthur's Hall" where recent archaeological findings reveal that it dates back over 5,000 years, to the Neolithic period, making it one of England's oldest structures and predating the legendary King Arthur by millennia.

Iain Rowe led a large group of us across Emblance Downs passing these stones in the foreground that have now been dug in more securely and gave a very interesting talk about the so-called 'King Arthur's Hall' which it isn't since archaeologists have now dated it back to the Neolithic period.
